## Recommendation:

A. THAT Council resolve to publicly exhibit the dog controls listed in Table 1 and Table 2 of the report for community feedback.
B. THAT a report be brought back to Council following the exhibition with feedback results and final staff recommendations for Council's consideration.

## Executive Summary:

The purpose of this report is to seek Council endorsement to publicly exhibit the proposed changes to dog controls in public open space throughout the Woollahra Local Government Area (LGA).

The community survey for Council's draft Recreation Strategy 2021, completed by 211 people in early 2020, found that exercising the dog was the third most common recreational activity (other than organised sport) and was undertaken by $41 \%$ of residents. Only walking and swimming were more popular regular recreational activities.

It is a reasonable assumption that the proportion of people owning and exercising dogs today is likely much higher than the figure of $41 \%$ from two years ago, as it is well documented throughout Australia that there has been significant growth in dog ownership and exercise needs in public open space since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic and the resulting lockdowns, restrictions and changed work patterns.

The ensuing increased levels of dog exercise by individuals and families across all generations has also resulted in increased wear and tear issues in our open spaces and increased maintenance requirements for Council.

Dog exercise and dog management was also one of the most common themes that Council heard from the community in the 2020 survey for the draft Crown Reserves Plans of Management, which was completed by 480 people. Dogs provide companionship, a reason to exercise and socialising opportunities. People are passionate about their dogs, with many people considering dogs to be part of their family or valued companions, and they wish to have places for their dogs to run free.

The survey, however, revealed some acute conflicts of use across the LGA due to the high demand for, and frequent use of, all public open space. Conflicts of use identified in the survey include dog regulations not being adhered to, dog faeces not being picked up and differing opinions of what dog controls should be allowed in an area (e.g. sport being played during dog offleash times, dogs not being allowed in a natural area, etc).

The survey results also demonstrated that our community is quite evenly divided on the issue of dog management, with some people wanting more areas for dog walking while others want dogs to be restricted and / or prohibited from certain reserves. Given this split, a key action of Council's draft Recreation Strategy, which is scheduled to be placed on public exhibition from mid-January 2023 concurrently with our draft Crown Reserves Plans of Management and draft Play Space Strategy, is to undertake a review of dog controls across the LGA.

It should also be noted that during 2022, prior to the review of dog controls being undertaken, Council trialled a timed dog off-leash arrangement in Moncur Reserve, Woollahra, a park that was previously prohibited to dogs. While the trial is considered to have been successful, it will still be part of this current review and be included in the final recommendations to Council following the community consultation process.

Council also resolved during 2022, to make changes to Pannerong Reserve in Rose Bay from a dogs prohibited area to an on-leash area, in line with the results of community consultation held for that particular park. As the dog controls for Pannerong Reserve have already been finalised it will not be part of the consultation process proposed in this report.

## Discussion:

When reviewing and considering changes to Council's dog controls and whether an area of open space is appropriate for a dog off-leash area Council staff have used the following site suitability criteria:

- Size

The size of the park is important. It must be able to cater for dog exercise, other recreational activities, support infrastructure and landscaping.

## - Profile and access

The site must have an open park character for surveillance and safety. The site should be as accessible as possible for pedestrians and vehicles and be easily seen and known by the community. If possible, the site should not be located adjacent to high traffic roadways for the safety of dogs and people. Dog off leash may not be appropriate at some high profile sites (due to potential impacts on the site character or other users).

- Impacts on bushland and natural environment

Sensitive natural environments should not be impacted on. This includes sites with high biodiversity and environmentally sensitive natural watercourses and coastal vegetation, endangered ecological communities and threatened species habitat, including flora and fauna.

- Impacts on site character

There should be minimal impact on the visual appeal, landscape and function of the park due to the dedication of an off leash area or the inclusion of a fenced dog park. This includes ensuring any potential future enhancements to a park for recreation, sport or linear connections are not affected by a dog off leash area.

## - Impacts on people

Potential impacts on residents and other park users must be minimal, including no risk to children and adults playing sport, walking and cycling, using a play space or pursuing other recreation activities.

## - Playgrounds

Dogs are not permitted within 10m of a playground under the Companion Animals Act 1998, therefore fencing is usually required unless there are appropriate plantings or natural barriers. Pathways less than 10 m from a fenced playground are acceptable.

- Sportsgrounds

While sportsgrounds make great off-leash areas because of their size, they are used by schools, sports clubs, and casual users for a wide range of recreational activities, therefore timed off-leash arrangements are required for these spaces.

## - Beaches

The space available for various activities and the level of community use at the site, particularly by families with young children, must be considered.

- Memorials

Dogs off-leash are not considered appropriate within 10m of a memorial.

## Companion Animals Act 1998

Another key factor when considering changes to Council's dog controls is the NSW Companion Animals Act 1998.

The Act aims to promote responsible animal ownership in NSW. Some of the key regulations under the Act include:

- dogs in public places must be on a lead, except in a declared off-leash area
- dogs must be under the effective control of a competent person at all times
- dogs are prohibited within 10 metres of children's play areas
- dogs are prohibited within 10 metres of food preparation / consumption areas (except in certain approved circumstances as described in the paragraph below)
- dogs can be prohibited by the local authority in recreation and wildlife areas
- dogs can be prohibited by the local authority in places used for bathing (including beaches)
- if a dog defecates in a public place, the dog owner must remove and dispose of the faeces in a rubbish receptacle.

In relation to food preparation and consumption areas, for example the Redleaf Café, which is proposed to allow dogs on-leash in this report, the Act provides for the following arrangements:

14A Dogs not prohibited in outdoor dining areas in certain circumstances:
(1) The relevant legal restrictions do not prohibit a dog (other than a dangerous, menacing or restricted dog) from being in an outdoor dining area if -
(a) the dog is under the effective control of some competent person and is restrained by means of an adequate chain, cord or leash that is attached to the dog, and
(b) the person does not feed the dog or permit the dog to be fed, and
(c) the dog is kept on the ground.

## Review of current and proposed dog controls

The review of dog controls commenced with an internal review by the relevant Council officers of our current dog off-leash areas, which are summarised below in Table 1. It is considered that these current off-leash areas are, on balance, all working successfully, and therefore all are recommended to remain unchanged.

Council officers then undertook a review of the current dog on-leash and prohibited areas, which resulted in a number of recommended changes to be publicly exhibited. These are summarised below in Table 2.

A map of the proposed changes is provided below in Figure 1, which will form part of the public exhibition material.

## Community consultation

Community consultation for the proposed changes to dog controls will commence in early February 2023. This is to coincide with the commencement of the new school year and to allow a time gap between this consultation and the consultations for the draft Crown Reserve Plans of Management, draft Recreation Strategy and draft Play Space Strategy, which are scheduled to commence concurrently in mid-January. This timing will enable sufficient staff resourcing to organise the varoius consultations and allow for different consultations to be promoted to the community at different times.

Council's Animal Advisory Committee (AAC) will be consulted on the proposed changes during the public exhibition period and at the last AAC meeting the committee set Thursday 2 February 2023 as the date for that consultation meeting.

The consultation strategy for the proposed changes to dog controls will also include the installation of temporary signage in prominent locations in all of the affected parks and beaches. It will be widely exhibited with all of the usual engagement methods utilised.

The consulation period is proposed to run for six weeks so that it closes at least two weeks after the close of consultations for the other open space strategies listed above.

## Options:

Council may resolve in line with the recommendation/s as included in this report or Council may choose to resolve in some other manner.

## Community Engagement and / or Internal Consultation:

Internal consultations undertaken during the LGA-wide review of dog controls involved the following Council officers:

- Open Space \& Recreation Planning staff
- Parks maintenance staff
- Bushland maintenance staff
- Companion animal officers
- Rangers
- Sustainability and Environment staff

In addition, previous Council Notices of Motion were considered (as listed in Table 2 of the report) and Council's Animal Advisory Committee was informed about the review of dog controls at its meeting on 17 November 2022 and told that this report would be an Agenda item at the next FC\&S Committee meeting.

## Policy Implications:

Nil

## Financial Implications:

Following the review of the community feedback and the subsequent recommendations of changes to dog controls, there are potentially significant financial implications that will need to be considered by Council which are not currently included in Council's current Capital Works Program.

Details about the financial implications will be brought back to Council after public exhibition and the likelihood of the final number and location of dog off-leash areas is known, allowing a detailed estimate of probable costs to be prepared. Items with financial implications include:

- regulatory signs
- additional park bins
- drinking fountains with taps and dog bowls
- playground fencing.


## Resourcing Implications:

Further details about the resourcing implications will be brought back to Council after public exhibition when the final number and location of dog off-leash areas is known.

The community and Council's Animal Compliance Officers have identified the need for improved management and control of dogs through community education and awareness as a means to encouraging positive dog behaviour and increasing dog owners' sense of responsibility.

An awareness and education program that includes information, signage, and training opportunities in partnership with interest groups and the promotion of key messages is recommended to maximise successful delivery of the dog controls recommended in this report.

Funding for a community awareness and education program, both after the roll out of the new dog controls and on an ongoing basis, has not currently been allocated and will need to be addressed prior to the roll out.

## Conclusion:

The LGA-wide review of dog controls proposes a significant number of changes to the existing controls including an increase in the number of dog off-leash and on-leash areas.

The proposed changes are now ready for community consultation. Should the recommendation be approved by this Committee to proceed to public exhibition, a further report will to be brought back to Council following that consultation process with the results of the feedback and recommendations for adoption.
